One of the greatest aspects of being at the NFRW Convention was meeting like-minded women from all over the country. The pin-exchange was one way to break the ice, but Republicans don't seem to need much incentive to extend a hand of friendship. We met so many great ladies who, like us, are fighting to preserve our way of life and this very country. Here's a snapshot of one of the delegates whose name I can't recall but whose blazer I'll never forget.

Friday night was the kickoff of the NFRW Convention, and "the hits just kept on comin.'" First, we heard from Senator



Tim Scott from South Carolina who set a perfect tone for the evening. He was followed by Florida Governor Ron DeSantis, another effective leader who brought the crowd of about 1,000 to its feet. He urged us to action with the words, “The Left is playing for keeps—aided by partisan, dishonest corporate media, Big Tech, and the DC bureaucratic swamp. They will smear and lie to hold on to power. So get in the fight. Stand your ground. Hold the line. And don’t ever back down.” The applause was deafening.



On Saturday, NFRW President Ann Schockett welcomed delegates, followed by the United States Space Force (Proposed) Anthem, the Parade of State Presidents, and the Invocation. Then, Central FL Cub Scouts Pack 6 treated us to the Presentation of Colors. To see those young ones treating our flag with such honor and respect brought tears to my eyes, and I wasn’t alone. Nothing drives home how much we have to lose like seeing a few young people standing up for our country.



Imagine over 800 voices with every regional accent you can think of united in the pledge of allegiance. It was beautiful! We heard from Former Governor of Arkansas, Mike Huckabee, who has grown a beard (in preparation for the second job he’ll have to take as a Santa at Walmart if inflation keeps

skyrocketing as it is under Biden). He was fantastic and inspirational. After he spoke, he remained on stage as Ingrid Lake (of Bakersfield, CA, nominee for CFRW 1st VP) accepted the NFRW’s prestigious Public Relations Award on behalf of California.

We heard from Roman Buhler, the Director of Keep Nine Coalition, protecting the integrity of the





Supreme Court. The new slate of officers for 2022 was announced, and there were no nominations from the floor. California was awarded the Campaign Volunteer Award for excellence in donating volunteer time to the benefit of the Republican Party, Republican Candidates, or the NFRW. California had the largest number of hours for our 80+ clubs with 2,140,000 hours. That's why it's important to keep track of your volunteer hours. The total volunteer hours reported by all states was 8,037,445, so California is responsible for bringing in over 1/4 of those hours!



Congressman Michael McCaul (TX) and Congresswoman Claudia Tenney (NY), and other Republicans fighting for us in Congress



and elsewhere spoke. The Saturday luncheon that followed was lovely and featured past CFRW President Nam-Yong Horn (now a resident of Arizona). Screenwriter Howie Klausner showed us a sneak peek of his film *Reagan*, starring Dennis Quaid and Jon Voight, and others you'll recognize. The film is scheduled for release in 2022.

The highlight of the afternoon was Governor Kristi Noem addressing us in person. She reminded us how vital it is for women to be involved in government by sharing, "When a woman is at the



negotiating table when a peace negotiation is going on, resulting peace agreements are 35% more likely to be effective." She

gave us a call to action like no other

to get involved and admonished us, "Be careful what you ask the government to 'solve' for you." She had the crowd rising to our feet!



After various workshops, Club Achievement Awards were presented. I was so honored as your president to

hear our club's name called and to walk up on stage to receive my President's Diamond Award pin and our club's certificate. Afterwards, NFRW President Ann Schockett posed for a photo with each club president and thanked us for our club's work.

After the awards ceremony, we had a California get-together in a suite, and many but not all California delegates posed for a photo on a staircase at the hotel.

The next morning began with the Prayer Breakfast. What a spectacular event that "Be the Light" breakfast was. We



enjoyed wonderful music and a message by Rabbi Aryeh Spero. An NFRW tribute commemorating the 20th anniversary of the September 11th attacks was very moving as was the remembrance of the 13 soldiers recently (and needlessly) killed in Afghanistan.

We were reminded of the words of Isaiah 60:1, "Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you."



We then went into the General Session, highlights of which included the Spirit of '76 Band and remarks by Rabbi Spero. After the bylaws report and rather heated discussions on the floor regarding a myriad of issues, the bylaws changes were voted on, followed by Commentator

(and Comedienne) Katie Hopkins, who will be with us at the CFRW Convention in Rancho Mirage (and she alone would be worth the price of admission).



We heard from Gordon Chang, author and China expert and others. Another award went to

California that many of you helped our state win: Elaine Anthony accepted the Armed Services Award. If you donated to the Gary Sinise Foundation, California's statewide Armed Service Project, your generosity helped gain California some much-deserved recognition. Thank you!



The National Officer election results were announced, the new slate of officers was approved, and the gavel was passed to new NFRW President, Eileen Sobjack, whose remarks closed out the convention. It was an incredible experience, and I learned so much just meeting and talking with other club presidents and attendees. I haven't yet heard where the 2023 NFRW Biennial Convention will take place, but wherever it's held, I'd say it's worth the trip.
